Federal Assistance for Maui Survivors Tops \$152 Million

Since wildfires swept over the Island of Maui Aug. 8, more than \$152.29 million in federal assistance has been approved for 6,064 households. FEMA is working closely with Maui County, the State of Hawaii and federal and nonprofit partners, with a commitment to helping Maui residents continue their recovery.

Recovery by the Numbers

- FEMA has approved \$28,349,655 for individuals and households, including:
 - \$13,624,349 approved for housing assistance; and
 - \$14,725,305 approved for Other Needs Assistance.
- The U.S. Small Business Administration has approved \$123,948,600 in disaster loans for affected Maui homeowners, renters and businesses.
- Three Maui County Disaster Recovery Centers are open in Kahului, Lahaina and Makawao. At the centers, survivors can speak to FEMA specialists, get help applying for disaster assistance, connect with voluntary organizations and access other federal and state resources. The centers are open from 8 a.m. to 7 p.m. seven days a week. Some 16,073 survivors have visited the Disaster Recovery Centers since the first center opened Aug. 16.

It is also an opportunity to provide new or additional information not previously submitted that may affect FEMA's decision.  - Survivors can apply for permits on a zone-by-zone basis at the Lahaina Civic Center and at the Kalana O
 Maui county building.

Rental Properties Wanted for Temporary Disaster Housing

• FEMA has approved two direct housing programs for Maui County survivors. For each program, FEMA will work with property management companies that act on behalf of the government and contract with property owners of rental units. The units are offered to survivors for up to 18 months. Maui County, the State of Hawaii, FEMA and the private sector are seeking owners of rental units suitable for families and individuals for either program. FEMA Public Assistance: Cost-Share Adjustment Grants More Funds for Hawaii

- President Biden has made additional disaster assistance available to the State of Hawaii by authorizing an
 increase in federal funding for eligible projects under FEMA's Public Assistance program. The projects must be
 undertaken as a result of the wildfires beginning on Aug. 8 and continuing.
- Due to the scale and amount of damage caused by the wildfires, federal funds for debris removal in Maui County are authorized at 100% of the total eligible costs for a continuous 180-day period of the state's choosing within the first nine months after Aug. 8.





• Federal funds for emergency protective measures, including direct federal assistance, are authorized for Maui and Hawaii counties at 100% of the total eligible costs for a continuous 90-day period of the state's choosing.

U.S. Small Business Administration

- SBA representatives continue to be available at federal/state disaster recovery centers and Business Recovery Centers in Maui, Oahu, Kauai and Hawaii to provide information on SBA disaster loans and help each applicant apply to SBA.
